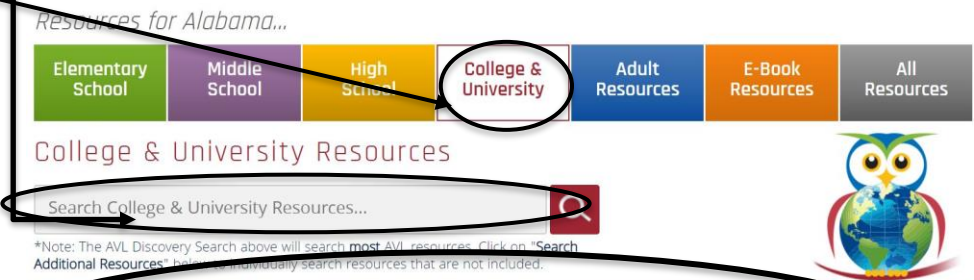

## Research Tips for Articles within the Alabama Virtual Library

- Select *College & University* the red square on the main page. This page provides a link to *All* or a selection of links to specific search topics. From the All section, For **research**, you should select **individual links to the following: Academic Search Premier, Book Collection: Nonfiction, Britannica Academic, Business Insights Essentials, Business Source Premier, EBSCOhost Search, Gale eBooks, Gale General OneFile, Gale OneFile Business, Gale OneFile: Culinary Arts, Gale OneFile: Gardening and Horticulture, Gale OneFile: Home Improvement, Gale One File: Hospitality and Tourism, Gale Power Search, General OneFile: Vocations and Careers, GreenFile, Image Collection via MasterFILE Premier, MAS Ultra School Edition, Regional Business News and, Vocational and Career Collection.**

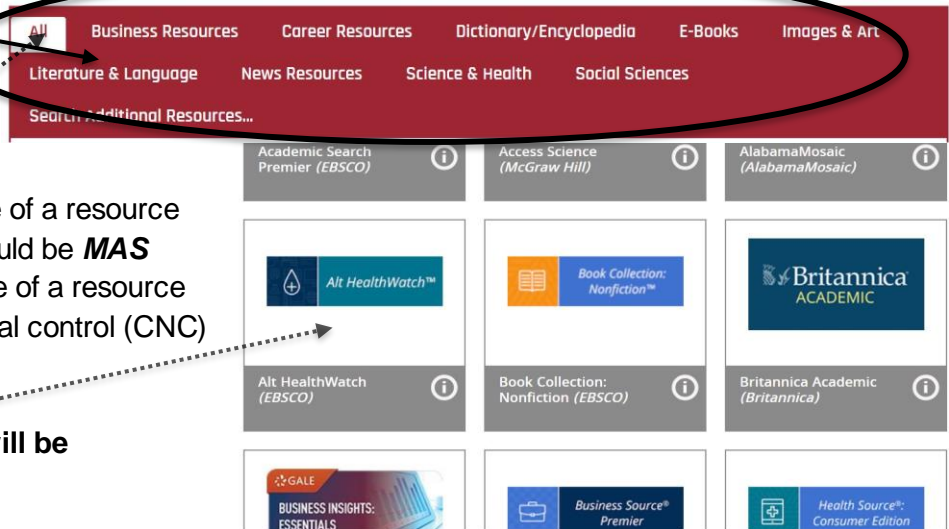
### Select College & University Discovery Search

- Enter the topic to research. A varying amount of information will be displayed. Limiters will need to be applied to access items relevant to your research needs.



### Specific Database topic search

- Search from any database in this collection that pertains to your topic of interest. These links provide access to the information you need. An example of a resource for research on collision repair would be **MAS Ultra School Edition**. An example of a resource for research on computer numerical control (CNC) would be **Gale General OneFile**.



If **All** is selected, all of the databases will be displayed.

### Hints for deeper research

- Remember, statistics are always important when discussing a particular point in a paper.
- Use truncation and Boolean search terms to attain a more specific search. Truncation is a searching technique used in databases in which a symbol replaces a word ending. Frequently used truncation symbols include the asterisk (\*), a question mark (?) or a dollar sign (\$). Quotations marks may be used to group words together. An example is “women’s rights.” Boolean is the combination of words using, AND, NOT and OR. An example would be News not Paper or Magazine.

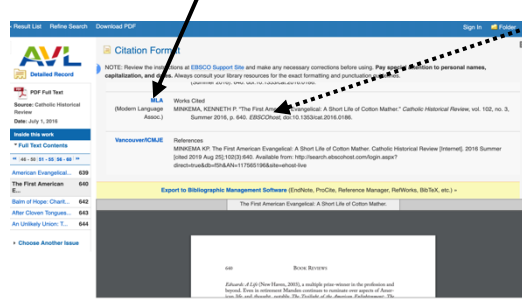
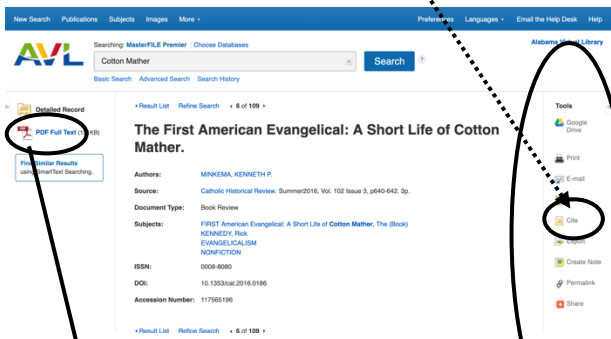

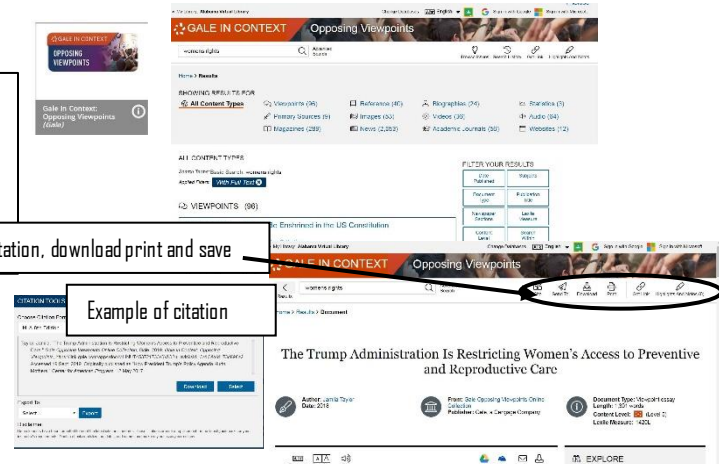
## Gale In Context: Opposing viewpoints

Print or view PDF for full-text information.

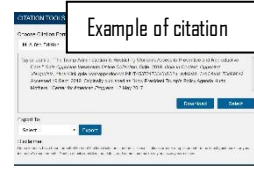


Saving research EBSCO products- individual items can be saved in Google Drive or various other formats.

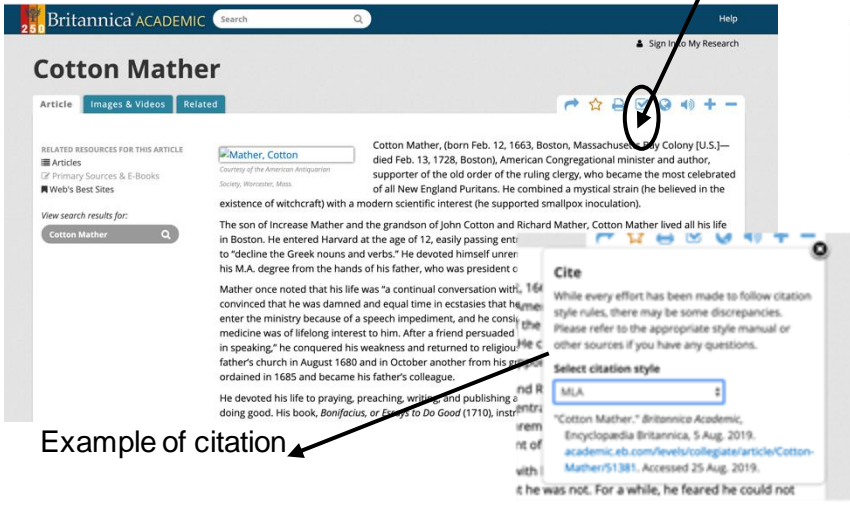
Tool bar for citation, download print and save

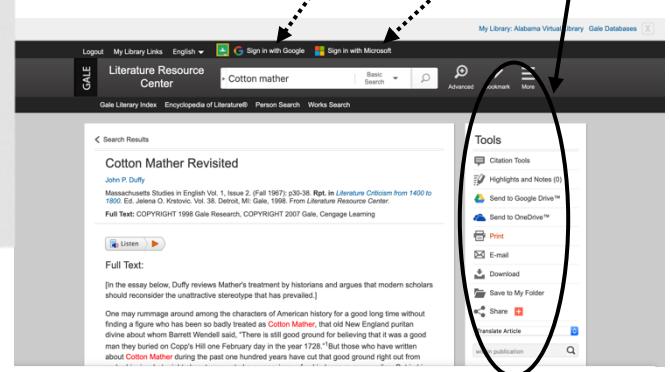
- Options for **Britannica Academic**. From this page, select the citation tool. From this page, select type of citation format.



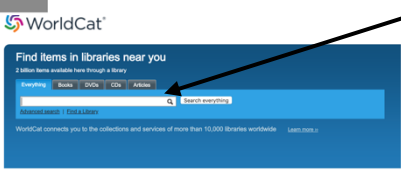
